PRESENTER LINK	Cardiff may have to sort its waste into separate containers to boost the city's recycling rate. A pilot trial has been carried out in 1000s of households. Residents say they are concerned about the change. Yun-Chieh Lin reports.
SHOTS OF HOUSING IN LLANDAFF	It's the recycling collection day in Llandaff – a chosen region for called the Council's new recycling trial.
DIFFERENT RECYCLING BAGS	Residents here are now asked to separately a recycling bins into different bags and caddies,
MATTHEW WALKING OUT OF HOUSE	Rod Matthew has been sorting his bins with the provided containers. He says given the weather these bags are not practical.
INTERVIEW	There'll be rubbish all over the place in the wind, because as I said, the sacks just aren't suitable for the purpose. The sacks are weighted they're supposedly windproof but they're not. And we live in Wales. I mean, Wales is not a very nice place as far as weather is concerned. So you get winds, you get rain, and they're just too flimsy for the purpose.

DIFFERENT RECYCLING BAGS	Paper card, glass bottle, plastic and metals. Some says they are too much for the elderly to handle.
INTERVIEW	I have a neighbour up the street. He's over eighty years of age and is unable to do it. He just puts everything into one sack. And then when his son comes his son goes and puts it into the into the main refuse bin but it's just too awkward for them to move all these bags around.
HOUSES IN GRANGETOWN NON-RECYCLING BIN BAGS	Cardiff Council is thinking about expanding the pilot scheme to the whole city.  The capital currently has the worst recycling rate in Wales at 55% while the average stands at 65.
SET UP SHOT OF ALENNA	Alenna Khan comes from Grangetown. She says she appreciates the Council's efforts but needs to go over the plan again.
INTERVIEW	I'm not really sure residents will be too happy to see so many bags on the street because it does impact the kind of attractiveness of the street and the aesthetics. Additionally, I'm not sure how kind of strong these bags are – they may tip and they may obstruct people and pedestrians who are trying to walk and this impacts those who use wheelchairs. So that is something that the government need to consider.

<p>PIECE TO CAMERA OUTSIDE COUNCIL HEADQUARTERS</p>	<p>Cardiff Council is trying to get its recycling rate to 70% by 2024 for a target set by the Welsh Government.</p> <p>Since separation, the council's hoping it can bring up the city's recycling rates and also improve the quality of our recycled things.</p>
<p>COUNCILLOR SET UP SHOT</p>	<p>Councillor Michael Michael is the man behind the pilot scheme. He says the trial has made a huge contribution to the environment.</p>
<p>INTERVIEW</p>	<p>What we've done is put a trial together for the last four weeks and 4000 houses in the city and what's that shown is the initial results are showing the contamination has gone down from 30% to 3%, which is a fantastic difference.</p>
